Holiday Gifts for Us



All of us have friends, usually other dog ‘people’, with whom we exchange gifts. These often tend to be the same old hodge podge of doggy related presents that we find at the dog show malls and boarding kennel stores, etc. I want to throw out a few additional ideas for gifts that can be more meaningful and special for your friends.

Some gifts don’t require wrapping! Have you considered making a donation to the local Animal Shelter in your friend’s name, or making such a donation to a local breed rescue group or even a national group? This can be a very special gift that not only recognizes and honors your friend but helps our beloved pets who are “homeless”. Don’t forget Take The Lead!

Another idea is to borrow or take a photo of your friend’s dog and have it turned into a painting or jigsaw puzzle. There are individuals and companies that can do this. Or! If you are a decent photographer, take a photo of their dog and blow it up and frame it as a gift. People are always thrilled to receive nice photos of their dogs.

If you decide to do this, however, you want to be sure that you take a good well-focused photo with the dog in a good position. A hint—when you do a head shot, focus on the eye and the rest of the head will generally be in focus. I used to do some dog photography, and I tried to also get a good background, either something that indicated the dog’s activities such as jumps, hunting fields and shots, agility equipment, etc. Be sure that those backgrounds are a good contrast or complementary setting for the dog. Also stress not having a lot of distractions in the photo such as a bunch of people, busy activities, etc. True, you can eliminate a lot of that with a good computer program, but you’ll save a lot of time if you have a decent background to begin with. The best photos will give a good idea of the dog’s personality and favorite activities or belongings. Toys are a

good prop, but use them with caution as they could distract the dog when you are shooting the photo. Many cameras are now pretty much point and click types with fewer options as to light, focus, and telephoto. Be sure to frame the picture with enough space at the borders to allow for framing without cutting off a tail or nose, etc. Last of all, remember the rule of thirds—the interest points that are most effective are one third in from all sides. That is where you want the most important aspect of the photo whether it’s the whole dog (check out Clint’s photo of Kaia on the beach in the Oct. issue) or in a head shot, the eyes. Have a friend help you if possible to get the dog alert and happy. This is just a very brief jotting of the most important aspects of shooting a photo. If you want my help in actually shooting such a photo, just call me; I’d be glad to work with you.

From the kitchen you might give cookies in the shape of your friend’s breed—there are a number of cookie cutters of various breeds. Also, funny named cookies (Beagle Bagels, Chocolate Labradors, etc.) might be very cute and tasty. You could even throw in the cookie cutter as part of the gift.

Use your imagination. Decoupage a Kleenex box with photos of their favorite breed or even with photos of their dog. Make a wall hanging quilt (a little late for that this year...) with their dog or breed or rally symbols as designs. Embroider some towels with their breed or try and find some material and make a gift from that. Heck, use the material to wrap a present, promising to use that material to make whatever they want (within reason, of course).

Another idea, give a card that is good for so many yard cleanings for a year or dog washings or toenail clippings, etc. Gifts don’t have to be expensive to be gifts. Thoughtful ones are often even better received! Enjoy your holidays, folks, and **HAPPY HOLIDAYS TO ALL!!!**

Pam Sehmer will be presenting a seminar on teaching dog sports—NOT how to do the actual exercises, but how to plan and present the classes themselves. Since one of our main activities is the teaching of classes no matter which venue—obedience, agility, rally, etc.—we teach, the general approach is similar. Pam was a P.E. instructor by trade and can give us some good ideas for setting up lesson plans, running the class so that we get what we want accomplished in an hour, and how to work with 'problem' students, etc. This seminar will be held Dec. 3-4 at the training site so plan to come! You won't need your dogs for this one.

A very different sort of seminar is being held on Saturday, December 3. Dr. Michael Tomasic, VMD, DACVA will offer his seminar on Working and Performance Dog Soundness for the first time in New Mexico. It will be held at the Inn at Rio Rancho Conference Center and has working spaces for 15 humans and dogs plus a number of auditors who will not get to have the hands-on training. In the afternoon, he will offer private examinations for your dog. The afternoon session is limited to a total of 10 dogs. Dr. Tomasic runs the Veterinary Pain Solutions Clinic treats chronic and acute pain in animals. He uses a variety of solutions often different from the drug-based approach used by most vets. He is known world-wide for his expertise on anesthesiology and pain management, has published numerous articles, and continues to research and present on new treatment protocols. He targets medical or minimally invasive treatments and combines this with rehabilitation work. He was on the staff of the University of Pennsylvania School of Veterinary Medicine and established a formal pain management service at the famed New Bolton Center which the University uses for large animal treatment. This sounds like a different and helpful seminar. Cost is \$75 for a working spot, \$50 for auditor spots and an extra \$55 for a private session in the afternoon. 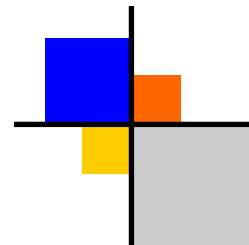

VST Trial a Success

The Sandia Dog Obedience Club held its fourth annual VST Test in Albuquerque, NM, on the UNM campus on Oct. 16, 2011. Five dogs were entered. No dog passed, but two of the dogs found and indicated the first intermediate article, and one of the dogs also completed her “moment of truth” turn. Track #1 started in a large playing field. The dog did a great deal of searching in that field and did not appear to be picking up the tracklayer’s path, though he did work in the direction the tracklayer walked and turned in the direction of the first turn. He failed by missing the second turn. The other dogs all started well. One dog failed when he stopped working at his first turn, and the other three failed by turning off the track and going too far to recover—one at a bridge and the others among and near buildings.

The Central Campus, which we judges used for four of the five test tracks, is imaginatively landscaped mostly in dry mode but with a large central mounded lawn area surrounding a duck pond. The North Campus includes steeply terraced building complexes and passage ways below a large open flat area with buildings surrounded by grassy strips, one good sized lawn and two enormous parking lots. We plotted the fifth track in the flat upper section of the North Campus. On both campuses we found enough grass to include much more than the required 33% vegetated surface in each track, but less than 50%.

The tracks were laid starting at 5:00 am. They were run at 1/2 hour intervals, beginning at 8:00 am. Although temperatures rose later in the day, the air temperature remained cool during the test—we were comfortable in fleece jackets. Skies were clear and there was almost no wind.

A highlight of the test was watching a Road Runner at the start of Track #3. The bird seemed fascinated by the working dog and followed her for a while. Maybe he was attracted to the shiny greenhouse shade cloth “cool coat” the dog wore under her tracking harness.

This test was beautifully organized. The tracklayers were experienced and absolutely reliable. After the test was completed, Laurel Shelton, the Test Chair, asked for suggestions for improvements, and we couldn’t think of any! Actually, Laurel also helped us judges late Saturday afternoon, after the tracks had been plotted, while we were comparing calculations for our official charts. She sat down with us and used her calculator to do the addition as we called out numbers of yardage recorded on our field maps. It’s amazing how helpful this is.

Many thanks to Test Chair Laurel Shelton, Test Secretary Penni Adrian, Chief Tracklayer Lynn Wilson, Tracklayers Ken Collier, Pat Sayles, Rosemary Burtch, Lisa Franklin and Tom Redmon.

As always, it was wonderful fun to share this judging assignment with Tracking Judge Carol Pernicka. Most of all, thank you the exhibitors for training and entering your beloved dogs!
